The Australian Network for Plant Conservation (ANPC) and the Centre for Australian Biodiversity Research (CANBR) cordially invite you to support our national plant conservation conference to be held in Canberra in November 2018 on the theme of "Moving House - a new age for threatened plant translocations and restoration".

The 12th Australasian Plant Conservation Conference (APCC12)

will bring conservation researchers and practitioners together to discuss the recent advances in species translocation across Australia. Species translocations have been an important conservation approach for more than two decades to save threatened species from extinction. With no foreseeable reduction in threats from climate change, urban and agricultural expansion and intensification, and invasive pests and diseases, translocations will be increasingly important into the future.

To coincide with the release of the third edition of the ANPC's Threatened Plant Translocation Guidelines we will bring together a diverse range of the leading botanists, ecologists, land managers, and on-ground plant conservation workers from around Australia, from universities, government, consultancies, NRM groups and NGOs to discuss some of the latest scientific findings and practical outcomes for successful threatened plant translocations.

Conference subthemes are:

- » Moving house lessons from the past who's done what where and what do we now know? Exploring plant introductions across Australia over the past 30 years.
- » Moving house what's new? This session will include new approaches, ideas or tools to assist you when making decisions about moving plants.
- » Policy and politics of moving plants
 Here we will explore the policy and politics of moving plants hear from experts about their expectations for policy that guides when, how and where we move plants.

» Crossing over – what can we learn from moving organisms other than plants?

This session will include presentations about what lessons have been learnt by moving other types of organisms to expand our under standing of the role and importance of plants.

- » Effective partnerships who, why and how? What works and what doesn't?
 - Showcasing partnership projects including citizen science where multiple stakeholders have engaged in translocation and restoration projects.
- » Do you need a safe deposit box? The importance of ex-situ conservation in translocation

Here we will explore the role of *ex situ* conservation in plant translocation and restoration including examples of successful plant reintroductions from *ex situ* collections.

The conference will be held at the CSIRO Discovery Centre, which is centrally located to the Canberra city centre, ANU, the Australian National Botanic Gardens and backs onto the Black Mountain bushland reserve. A week of exciting presentations, field trips and a threatened plant translocation workshop are planned.

What is the Australian Network for Plant Conservation?

The Australian Network for Plant Conservation is a non-government, non-profit organisation which aims to promote and develop plant conservation.

Our objectives are to:

- » Facilitate the exchange of high quality plant conservation information between scientists and on-ground practitioners.
- » Promote on-ground conservation, rehabilitation and management of remnant vegetation, threatened plants and ecological communities.
- » Contribute to international plant conservation.

The ANPC is a national network that links people, research and action in plant conservation. We work to ensure that scientific and on-ground knowledge are accessible to everyone. The ANPC is an incorporated body and includes a range of stakeholders interested in plant conservation. We specialise in training and the transfer of the best available science, so the conservation effort and dollar are well spent.

What do we do?
